School-based Literacy Program **Experiences Exponential Growth**

Since the first LEC Literacy and Technology Lab was established in 2007 at Richard Bowling Elementary School, the LEC has remained committed to its mission to provide elementary students with the tools needed to become proficient readers. Trained tutors commit to spend one hour each week for one school year with a student who is reading below their grade level. During the course of the year, a strong bond is formed between the tutor and student. Working together using computerized literacy software provided by the school, the tutor helps the student become a more confident and competent reader. Tutors from area non-profit and for-profit organizations served at Richard Bowling, Jacox, P. B. Young, Sr., James Monroe, and Tidewater Park Elementary Schools during the 2014-15 academic year.

Local Health Management Firm Adopts **Title I School**

Angela Reddix, president and CEO of ARDX, a Virginia-based corporation launched in 2006 to provide healthcare management consulting services to government agencies and private companies. partnered with the Life Enrichment Center to elevate the reading scores of children from Chesterfield Academy in Norfolk. They funded a Literacy and Technology Lab at the school and provided incentives for their employees to participate in the LEC's school based literacy initiative. Over **35** of the company's employees tutored a child one hour a week during the second half of the 2014-2015 academic year. This past summer, ARDX also partnered with Chesterfield Academy to host a nutrition and fitness class for the residents in Grandy Village, the local community that the school serves.

ODU Funds Another Technology and Literacy Lab

Old Dominion University has been a generous LEC partner. They recently agreed to fund a second center in a Title I elementary school in Norfolk. The Technology and Literacy Lab will be used to tutor students in grades K-2 who are reading below their grade level. The LEC will mobilize, train, and supervise the volunteer tutors who will meet with students during the academic year. This brings to ten the total number of literacy labs the LEC oversees in Norfolk Title I elementary schools.

Norfolk Police Officers Tutor Inner-City Children

Close to 40 Norfolk police officers partnered with the Life Enrichment Center to tutor children one hour a week for one academic year. The schools were thrilled to host the officers and the students enjoyed



their weekly time with their tutors. Chief Goldsmith has fully embraced the program and new officers are being trained to join their colleagues in ensuring that children from low income communities are given the tools needed to succeed in school. This partnership will also allow the children to interact with the police officers in a positive manner, enabling mutually respectful relationships to develop. These relationships formed over the past year will extend far beyond the classroom, impacting not only the students, but their neighborhoods and families as well.
